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## Planning a Rotary Christmas?

Does your club have a passion for giving Rotary a future by keeping it connected to the wider community and coming generations?

If so, you might be interested in a pre-Christmas collaboration with local school children and the RAWCS project SchoolKits for Congo.

The project is about realising the human right to education for children denied it, but also about reviving Australia's flagging interest in Global Citizenship, Development and Service.



SchoolKits for Congo encourages children to be aware of the the advantages of Australian citizenship and to recognise their own growing power to help less fortunate children to experience the longed-for education that we can take for granted.

The children will personalise an 8-page picture book (in French or Swahili) to accompany a SchoolKit (bag, uniform and learning materials) which will be given to a child in Goma who has fled violence on foot, and has nothing to start a new life in a new place.

The pack costs A\$45, which is a lot for a child to contribute, and for a teacher to coordinate. Your club can provide an Intergenerational Rotary Solution!

Whether club members individually support each child in a class to provide one SchoolKit, or whether the Club decides jointly to fund one SchoolKit per class member, this is a lovely way for Rotarians to connect locally now, to promote philanthropy for the future and to Serve Above Self where that service is most needed.

SchoolKit backpacks and uniforms are made in Goma, DRC, by women trained and equipped by Rotary and SewAid, realising their Human Right to the dignity of work to house, feed and educate their families.

## The ER Co-ordinator's Report

CEO Mahir Momand and Chairman David Pearson recently held a webinar to provide an update on the directions of the RAWCS Board and the National RAWCS team especially to describe the RAWCS Value Proposition that the Board has created and the updated Strategic Plan. Link to the YouTube Webinar.

RAWCS was established nearly 60 years ago by Rotarians in Australia with the purpose of facilitating humanitarian projects. To-date, it has facilitated \$0.5 billion for thousands of projects benefiting hundreds of thousands of humans in nearly 50 countries, including Australia, changing countless lives.


RAWCS is able to provide tax deductions for donations on the basis that it is a duly registered charity and meets the obligations to a range of regulatory bodies in Australia including the Australian Charities and Not-for Profit Commission (ACNC), The

Australian Taxation Office (ATO), Australian Securities and Investment Commission (ASIC), Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (DFAT).



**Value Proposition** - RAWCS is Rotary's largest Multi District organisation worldwide. This is in no small way because it has a very successful model which RAWCS has followed since it was initially established. RAWCS Projects receive the following benefits:

- 1. RAWCS has a comparatively low administration fee on donations at 5%. This administration fee Is a one-off fee which is paid when the donation is made. No further fee is incurred by either the donor or the Project Managers. The 5% fee is significantly lower than the 9% charged by Rotary Foundation Australia and the 15-30% range recommended by Philanthropy Australia for charities and not-for-profits. Despite our actual operating costs being 9%, RAWCS subsidises 4% from our reserves to keep the costs low and the impact high.
- 2. The process for registering a project is fast and efficient. RAWCS willingly provides advice and coordination to Rotarians when clubs are setting up their projects. RAWCS connects Project Managers of new projects with those responsible for longer term similar projects.
- 3. Donations to registered RAWCS projects are tax deductible for the donors. This frequently represents a tax advantage of 30% depending on the incremental tax rate of the donor.



- 4. RAWCS is now in the process of sourcing external funds for projects and is endeavouring to make this source of external funds more widespread. It is anticipated that once the public sees the work we do this will lead to more funding being available. It is expected this should also lead to more people interested joining Rotary.
- 5. RAWCS has a comprehensive range of instructional manuals covering all aspects of projects and volunteers which are publicly available on the RAWCS website. The manuals are the result of much time spent by very experienced Rotary volunteers. They provide a very significant value to anyone undertaking projects.
- 6. RAWCS undertakes to provide and update policies and procedures to ensure that projects are compliant and volunteers are safe.
- 7. RAWCS provides comprehensive registration and insurance for volunteers registering to undertake a project and provides cover for both Rotarian and Non-Rotarian volunteers.
- 8. Administration of compliance requirements to provide the tax-deductible receipts is completely handled within the secretariat of RAWCS and the online RAWCS donation system. There is therefore no further concern for the Project Managers in meeting the compliance requirements of ATO.
- 9. RAWCS provides a platform for project reporting and auditing to comply with the various regulatory organisations.
- 10.RAWCS facilitates prompt international funds transfer at excellent exchange rates.
- 11.RAWCS provides ongoing administrative and technical advice to support Project Managers.
- 12.RAWCS is Rotary. RAWCS is a unique organisation as Rotary's largest Multi District Organisation, however all its operations are in accordance with Rotary values, for and by Rotarians.

**Updated Strategic Plan** - RAWCS is refining its strategic plan with an emphasis on four criteria:

- 1. Renewing the operation of the organisation to fit with the contemporary world. The National RAWCS team also constantly reviews the changing external and internal (Rotary) environments in which we operate in to ensure that projects and our systems are not vulnerable to changes in government regulations, and the ever-increasing need to consider the cyber security of our projects and donor data bases.
- 2. Given the declining membership of Rotary and the reduced number of registered RAWCS projects the board is establishing other sources of funds outside Rotary in addition to within Rotary to support RAWCS projects. RAWCS is establishing connections with the philanthropic, corporate and government sectors as a source of funds.
- 3.RAWCS now has a communications strategy that determines how RAWCS communicates within the organisation and the external world.

This awareness campaign requires the assistance from project teams to provide photos and videos of the work being achieved by the projects so that this can be shared for the world to see the achievements of the projects.

4. Continual improvement and efficiencies in the RAWCS systems to make it simpler for Project Managers to manage their projects.

**Promoting RAWCS Projects** - To support the third strategy above Belinda Griffen is looking for photos, videos and one-page stories to advertise the great work being achieve. The material will be used to promote the achievements of the projects through the RDU Magazine, via the RAWCS Website and on social media. 

## Botswana, Here We Come!



Thanks to Rotary Club of Balwyn in Victoria, a new community centre has been constructed in a village where Rtn Lucy Hobgood-Brown lived as a child. Today Lucy facilitates community development initiatives in Lotumbe under the banner of HandUp Congo www.handupcongo.org and RAWCS www.rawcs.org.au.

The remote village is located in the heart of the world's second largest rain forest in the Democratic Republic of Congo's least resourced and most geographically challenged province. On June

23, the community centre was officially opened and dedicated by pastors. The centre provides a training room, offices, a sewing school and a library.

Lucy has also been busy working with Rotarian Dr Grace Maano (District 9660) on a global grant to provide obstetric emergency training of trainers in the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC).

But first, they will roll out two workshops at the African Federation for Emergency Medicine conference in Botswana November 4-5, and hold a special interest group meeting for Africans interested in developing emergency medicine education in the DRC. For details: handupcongo@gmail.com

## **Sewaid News**

#### Cambodia:

Responding to an urgent call for PUL (waterproof fabric) from our sewing workshop in Pursat Camboldia, we were able to arrange for DG Nirigan and Liz McDougal from District to carry a roll each to Cambodia when they visited there on a post-Singapore Convention tour. These two rolls will be enough to manufacture 500 Days for Girls feminine hygiene kits.



#### Fabric Donation:

We are very fortunate to have been donated some 650 rolls of brand-new fabric. This represents approximately 16,000 mtrs of lovely 1.5m wide polyester/rayon uniform fabric. The challenge for Sewaid now is to get this fabric to our Sewaid workshops worldwide.

We have already shipped one pallet of 65 rolls to Timor Leste this month, along with some new sewing machines and overlockers for our sewing rooms in Dili and Oecusse. Also, arrangements are in place to ship another pallet to our SewAid workshop in Kiribati next month. We have also distributed some rolls to small sewing workshops in Australia that sew children's clothes from Africa.

#### Congo

We have also just paid the next six months' rent for our sewing room in Goma, Congo DRC, as part of our ongoing commitment to supporting the work there.
